

In an interview with the correspondent of a New York paper on Friday, Major Saunderson said that the loyalist influence in parliament could not be gauged by its numerical strength. Many English and Scotch tory members had promised them support in their effort to breast the Parneillte tide. "Do you believe that the extraordinary agitation which the loyalists have set on foot has had its effect!" asked your correspondent. "Yes, an encommons effect. Abstract Orangeism appeals strongly to Protestant England, and I am satisfied that loyalists influence has more to do with the drastic references to the Irish question in the queen's speech than any other, and that the absence of distinct promises of local government in that document was due to the same cause." In further conversation Major Saunderson intimated that he was not prepared to say that the loyalists would not accept any proposal for local self-government for Irish which the franchise was placed high enough to exclude the proletariat, the backbone of Parneilism. His colleagues would undoubtedly give it due consideration, and vote for it under certain circumstances.
