VICTORIA COUNTY COUNCIL. January Session.

THURSDAY'S PROCEEDINGS. The council met at 2 p. m. with the warden in the chair, and most of the members TRENT VALLEY CANAL.

The WARDEN read a communication from he secretary of the Trent Valley canal committee at Peterboro relative to that project. -Preferred to the finance committee. NAVIGATION OF PIGEON RIVER.

DR. NORRIS moved, seconded by MR. BRACEBRIDGE MODEL SCHOOL.

The WARDEN read a report from Mr. Reazin, school inspector, regarding the Bracebridge model school, as follows:—

Upon the recommendation of the hon, the minister of education a model school was established at Bracebridge. The school was ably conducted by the head master, Mr. R. F. Greenlees. Fifteen pupils attended the first session, all of whom passed the final professional examination. The candidates were taught professional work in the forenoon, and non-professional subjects in the afternoon. At an interview with the hon, the minister of education in Toronto, it was proposed by myself and Inspector McKee of Simcoe, that the model school be a union one to include the Simcoe part of Muskoka, and that each county pay \$75 to it support, to which proposition the minister gave his assent. I beg further to state that a union district examination has for some years been held at Bracebridge, each county paying its own examiners, and bearing one-half the other expenses. A fee of \$2 each was charged for admission to the Bracebridge model exhert ses. A fee of \$2 each was charged for admission to the Bracebridge model school. which very nearly covered the expenses of the professional examination.

of the boundary between Ops and Mariposs:—

I have been requested by the members for Ops to give my opinion as to the construction of section 22 of chapter 39 of the municipal amendment act of 1885, which provides that "it shall be the duty of the county council to erect and maintain bridges over rivers forming or crossing boundary lines between two municipalities within the county."

"A road which lies wholly or partly between two municipalities shall be regarded as a boundary line within the meaning of this section, although such road may deviate so that it is in some place or places wholly within one of such municipalities, and a bridge built over a river crossing such road where it deviates as aforesaid shall be held to be a bridge over a river crossing a boundary line within the meaning of this section."

This section is very plain, but the application of it to the bridge in question is more difficult. I understand that upon the boundary between Op; and Mariposs the road is not built or a considerable distance of about a mile and a half the concession line between the first and second concessions of Ops is used by persons travelling north and south along the boundary deviating from the boundary to said concession line for the above distance, and upon this concession line there is a bridge over the river. Is this bridge within the section? Generally speaking a deviation means going from the line to avoid the obstruction and returning to it again as quickly as possible. If this is done in this case it would seem to me of little consequence whether the deviation was by another line or not; but it does seem to me that this is the fact that determines the matter. Could a road be made nearer to the boundary line which would better answer the purpose of a deviation than the line in question? If it could then it seems to me that this line could not be axid to be a deviation or a road used in lieu of the boundary; but if not I cannot see what difference it makes whether a line is used in lieu of the boundary; inste

The attention of your committee having been directed to the question of interest on advances made to the county, and the probability of a lower rate being obtained a sub-committee was appointed to wait on the manager of the bank of Montreal, and if necessary to wait on the managers of the other banks doing business in Lindsay. The manager of the bank of Montreal having offered to make all necessary advances until the next session of council at the rate of five per centum perannum and to give a month's notice of any intention to increase the rate, your committee recommend that in the meantime no change be made.

MONEY BY-LAW

MONEY BY-LAW On motion of Dr. Norris, a by-law was passed through the council to authorize the warden and treasurer to borrow money for necessary current expenditure.

VOLUNTEER RECEPTION COMMITTEE. Mr. Walters moved, seconded by Mr. Hopkins, that the following committee of this council be and are hereby appointed viz., the Warden, Messrs Broad, McQuade, Dr. Norris, Swanton, Fairbairn, Daniel and the mever and seconder, to carry out the report of the volunteer reception commit-tee, made at the December session, and that they shall not exceed the sum of \$250,

ROAD BY-LAW. MR. FAIRBAIRN introduced a by-law for the expenditure of \$750 on leading roads and bridges in certain municipalities as

January session and the council adjourned.
