The preliminary revision of the new voter's list for South Victoria concluded last Friday. About two hundred conservatives names were put on the list. Counting those put on at the first stage the reformers have a little more than that number. It was supposed that Mr. Moore and the Warder would be on hand with full affidavits or declarations for the identical "314," but a good many over one hundred of that famous list were not supported by proper documents. Only one conclusion can be drawn from this singular circumstance. Mr. Moore must have been acting on the rule laid down by the Warder about getting a hundred illegal names on the list. The result after the Warder's premature boasts about "a victory." and his unscrupulous attacks on the revising officers and THE POST, must be deeply humiliating to our comporary. It is completely flattened out and left in a state of "innocuous desuctude."

MR. GLADSTONES HOME RULE MEASURE.

We devote a large portion of our space to Mr. Gladstone's speech in introducing his measure providing home rule for Ireland. It is the all-engrossing topic the world over. While there are some defects in the measure Mr. Gladstone has undertaken his great task in a broad, liberal and sympathetic spirit; with a Christian statesman's noble desire to do full justice to Ireland, and to provide a just and comprehensive remedy for long endured and no longer endurable grievances. He goes at once straight to the core of the difficulty in acknowledging that the people must govern themselves; they must make their own laws; and that it is not enough to have good laws made for them by others. Mr. Gladstone has devoted his closing days to a task of tremendous difficulty; if his home rule and land measures pass into legislation they will justly rank as his greatest works of statesmanship. Even if they do not pass, home rule has been placed amongst the pressing questions that British statesmen must deal with effectively and promptly. It is no longer reform advocated by the Irish members merely. If rejected the alternative is stringent coercion, with all its attendant horrors, and no one is willing to face that. No doubt important improvements or changes will be made in the bill. Mr. Gladstone has announced that he never regarded the exclusion of the Irish members from the imperial house as a vital principle. He said the present Irish representation could not continue;


