Labor Notes. The regular meeting of "Hearts of Oak" Assembly, K. of L., will be held this Friday evening. A full attendance is requested. As to the working of the Knights of Labor organization the following from the Montreal Star presents a striking example of the justice in their demands and a desire to "live and let live." The employees of the Canada cutlery factory at St. Henry were about to strike for an increase of wages recently. The proprietors of the factory represented to them that their business was in a very bad state and that an increase could not at present be granted. At this stage the executive board of the Knights of Labor organization was called upon to look into the firm's affairs and find whether they were right in refusing to increase wages. The books were overhauled and it was found that higher wages could not possibly be granted. A meeting of the factory hands was called and the state of the firm's affairs made known to them. It was then decided that the wages all round should be reduced fifteen per cent and remain so for three months, and business is now becoming exceedingly prosperous and in a couple of months the wages will be increased, not merely fifteen per cent all round, but probably twice that amount. Not only was a strike averted in this case, but the best business of a firm was placed in a prosperous state. The proprietors of the factory and all the hands have now joined the union.
