THE DITCHES AND WATER COURSES ACT.

An important decision was recently given by his honor the county judge of Ontario, which should be made a note of by those interested in drainage matters. It appears interested in drainage matters. It appears that some time in the summer of 1885 several of the ratepayers of Cannington (an incorporated village) decided to construct a tile drain through a portion of that village under the ditches and water courses act of 1883. As usual several were not satisfied and appealed to the county judge under the provisions of the act.
