Mr. John Dryden, M.P., and County Councils.—At the last session of the provincial legislature a committee was appointed to consider the question of reducing the number of representatives at county councils. The committee secured a good deal of information, but did not arrive at any definite conclusion. The proposition most approved by the committee was one advanced by Mr. John Dryden, M. P.P. for South Ostario. Mr. Dryden proposes that the township councils and county councils shall be directly elected by pspular vote. He would divide the county into districts and elect one representative from each, or elect the whole council at large. He also suggests that the members of the county body should hold office for three years, one-third retiring annually. The Globe, in commenting on Mr. Dryden's proposition, thinks it may be that on the lines Mr. Dryden has laid down a satisfactory solution of the whole question may be worked out. The distribution of representation would not be materially affected by the proposed change, and ne doubt, as now, the members of the councils would be drawn from the minor municipal bodies. Perhaps the only difference of importance would be the abolition of dual services. By the plan of electing at large able and experienced men would be secured, and the toe prominent MR.
