Trent Valley Navigation Co'y.
On Friday night about eight o'clock the hourse whietle of the steamer Esturian was heard for the first time this year and announced the arrival at the wharf of the boat and the opening of navigation on the lakes. The Esturian left Bebeaygeon early in the morning with 600,000 feet of lumber in tow and was all day reaching Linday, being detained by the ice and having to sail a devious channel from one opening to another. On Saturday the Esturian sailed her regular trips and will continue on the time table as noted below until about the middle of next month, leaving Bobcaygeon at 5 o'clock, reaching Linday at 10 o'clock a.m.; leaving Linday at 10 m. reaching Bobcaygeon at 6 o'clock. Commodore Maurice Lane, the genial and obliging captain of the feet, commences—in command of the Esturian—his twenty fourth season in the employ of the same firm——inland waters. Commodore Lane has during his long term of service never met with an accident to boat or passengers, and enjoys in this respect a reputation quite the equal of a Cunard commander..... The Esturian will run steady for about two weeks when she will be taken off the route for a few days and repainted, the Beaubocage taking her place on duty. The beats of the Trent Valley line were very popular last summer, and as the company is prepared to supply every facility to accommodate both passengers and freight traffic will no doubtreceive a strong patronage. The completion of the locks at Fenelon Falls will open up a chain of waters accessable to the boats of the line and will be taken advantage of to extend the business.
