- An enthusiastic meeting of supporters of the Scott act was held at Peterboro on Wednesday evening of last week. Subscriptions were taken up amounting to \$4,725 to form a fund to provide

for the enforcement of the act. The hotel-keepers and liquor dealers of Peterboro have formed an association to combat the Scott act, and it has been decided to test its validity. The sum of \$5,000, it is said, has been subscribed to form a fund.

Sporting Notes.

Public attention is directed to the following changes in the fishery laws for the provinces of Ontario and Quebec: -Pickerel (Dore) cannot be caught from 15th April to 15th May; bass and askinonge cannot be caught from 15th April to 15th June. Each person guilty of violating these regulations becomes liable to fine and costs or in default of payment is subject to imprisonment. No person shall, during such prohibited times, fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or have in possession any of the kinds of fish mentioned above.

Defence that said defendants are released as surtices because at time of giving of mortgage the plaintiffs held commercial paper of the customers of Kyle & Co. as collateral security for the debt and that plaintiffs had since allowed the said commercial paper to pass out of their hands and instead of recovering payment, or renewale, substitution of genuine papers, the plaintiffs had accepted from Kyle & Co. certain forged paper and that the plaintiffs have not now genuine collateral paper to deliver over to the defendants. It appears from the evidence that of about \$50,000 of supposed commercial paper of thecustomers of Kyle & Co., now held by the plaintiffs, not more than \$2,000 is genuine and the remainder is forged.
