The Northwest Central Railway. A Field Day Over the Woodworth Reve-intions The Proposed Railway from Brandon to Sattleford Lavely The Botween Mesers. White and Mitchell.

(Special correspondence Montreal Star.)

OTTAWA, May 4,- The entire sitting of the house yesterday afternoon and the whole of the evening session until two o'clock this morning was devoted to the Northwest Central rallway bill. The facts, as admitted by all, including Mr. Beaty, may be refterated in order to help understanding of the lines taken in the house vestorday. In 1881 the Northwest Central Ballway Company was formed (on the basis of the previously existing Souris and Rocky Mountain Railway Company), with a capital stock of \$750,000, the intention being to build a road from Brandon to Battleford, 150 miles, When the company was reorganized Mr. Heatly came into posses. sion how, has not been explained of \$350 000 worth of the stock without paying uthing for it, not has he paid anything on it since, nor does he pretend that he intends to pay anything on it in the future. Ten per cent, of this stock has been paid. but I whom is not stated; not by Mr. Beatty. Mr. Beatty, therefore controls the company to day without having paid anything for his big half of the stock. In 1884 the company got a grant of land from government on the usual terms, namely, 0,400 acres of land per mile at \$1.00 per sere. This meant that the company considered it advantageous to underlake to pay some \$5 000 per mile for land all along that fourth. it advantageous to underlinke to pay some from per mile for land all along their rottler. But in 1885, the government adopted the policy of giving railways in the Northwest free grants of land. The Northwest Central immediately applied for a free grant, and got it, thus being some \$7,000 per mile better off than it had been satisfied with a vertue fore. 
