SENATOR JOHN O'DONOGHUE SPEAKS.

Senator John O'Donoghue told a large and interested audience in the senate last Friday how badly he has been treated and bamboozled by Sir John Macdonald. Mr. O'Donoghue, it is pretty well-known, was offered and accepted a seat in the Dominion cabinet, just prior to the general elections of 1882 when Sir John Macdonald wanted his support. But there was a very vigorous protest from certain Orange leaders in Toronto, wire-pulled, many believe, by the wily old chieftain himself. and John O'Donoghue had to be satisfied with the inglorious ease of a seat in the senate, -a trifling salary and little influence incomparison with what he was led to expect. Very few people will have much sympathy with Mr. O'Donoghue. If he did not know the man he was dealing with he ought to have known him.

One or two characteristic letters were read by Senator O'Donoghue in the course of the debate. When the arrangement was made in Toronto with Sir John on the one side and Messrs. O'Donoghue, Frank Smith, Patrick Boyle and John Shields, by which the latter were to work up and secure the Irish Catholic vote for Sir John, Mr. Frank Smith was to take temporarily the cabinet seat and keep it warm for Mr. O'Donoghue, the following letter was written by the crafty premier to the bishops of the Roman Catholic church.

As for Senator O'Donoghue few will waste any sympathy upon him.

second offences against the peshibitory emetaments of the Scott act cannot be reservered or enforced justify the enquiry you make respecting it. I do not believe that the eminent counsel whose name is used in connection with those rumors ever gave it as his opinion that the act is in that respect inoperative, because I find that in the case referred to further on, he, acting for the defundant, did not even hint that such was the case, and if the objection was valid he certainly would have availed himself of it.

It is true that section 100 of the Scott act deep not provide in what manner the fine of \$50 for the first offence and of \$100 for the second shall be resevered or enforced, and hence it is that same persons run away with the idea that although the fines may be imposed they caused be enforced.

Sec. 107 however provides that such offences "may be prosecuted in the manner directed by the "act respecting justices of the peace out of sections in relation to "summary convictions and orders," so far as no provision is made (in the Scott act) "for any matter or thing which may be required to be done with respect to such prosecution; and all the provisions of the said act (32 and 33 Vict., Cap 31) shall be "applicable to such prosecutions."

"in the same manner as if they were incorporated in this act (the Scott act." Now all the sections of the act so incorporated from 57 to 68, both inclusive, and particularly the latter parts of secs. 57 and 62, supply the required machinery to recover the amount of these fines and enforce the pensity. The latter part of sec. 57 reads: "Whereby the act or law in that behalf, no mode of raising or levying the pensity, compensation or sum of money, or of enforcing the same is stated or provided "the justice or any one of the justices making when the pensity is the travel of sec. 60, which reads as follows: "If (as is the case with the "Scott set) no term of imprisonment be "specified in the act or law, the period for "which the justice shall not exceed three months."

We therefore find that under sec. 100 of the Scott set, susplied with the machinery thus pointed out in 32 and 33 Vict., Cap. 31, the fines of \$50 and \$100 respectively may be recovered by distress of the offender's goods and chattels; and that in default of such goods and chattels; the offender may be imprisoned. It is worthy of notice also that whilst the penalty imposed by the Scott set for a third and every subsequent offence is imprisonment for not more than two months without the option of a fine, the imprisonment for a first or second offense (if imprisonment be reserted to) may be for three months.
