The barge is broad, of excellent floatage, pointed prow, and a part of the main deck is arranged as a cabin and provided with neat blinds to exclude heat and bad weather, and well roofed. The forward part of the main deck is open on the sides and in fine weather makes the pleasantest part of the barge. To the rear are suitable offices and a cabin for ladies and for the storage of baskets. Around the upper deck a neat railing is placed with musts and the deck makes a capital promenade. The barge is tastefully painted and is a credit to the enterprise of the company. For excursions, especially where children are taken out in numbers the barge is the proper thing, and we hope to see that it will be in use throughout the season for a succession of excursions. The court of revision on appeals from this cear's assessment met at the council chamber on Wednesday. Mayor Descen was chairman and Couns. Mallon, H. Walters and Keith constituted the court. Coun. Taylor was absent. In all fonty-three appeals were before the court, nearly all of which were against over assessment. The court set during the merning and again in the afternoon and pushed through about thirty of the cases.
