THE SCOTT ACT TRIALS.

On Friday morning at the police court the case against Edward Daly for selling liquor under the Sco" act was taken up before Magistrate O'Leary. Mr. John Mc-Sweyn appeared for the prosecution, and Mr. G. H. Hopkins for defence. Counsel went into some points with re-

sard to the refenence to be heard. Mr. Mc-Sweyn said that he would ask for an enlargement if all the witnesses were not present ... . Mr. Hopkins opposed any further adjournment, and claimed that witnesses present should be heard, and no others...
Magiatrate ()'Leary repeated to counsel that he definitely stated, early in the case that. Inspector Short had given him the sames of a large number of witnesses. Of this number several were subposened. These should be heard. If the case for the prosecution should be proved by these witnesses, that was all that the prosecution desired. If these witnesses were not sufficient, then Inspector Short had liberty to bring on other witnesses from among those whose themses had been handed in a fact. sames had been handed in at first, If witfesses would keep out of the way it would delay the case, but, he, (Magistrate O'Leary,) intended to hold the court until sil the winesses subpoened had been serv-

Mr. Hopkins again objected to prosyidence of witnesses taken in this case at former sittings of the court was read over, Inspector Short and Chief of Police Bell being the witnesses.

Mr. McSWEYN select Officer Bell to state the names of witnesses served by summons to appear on July 2nd, and found that these were A. H. Melville, Richard Leary and Thos. C. Matchett. These witnesses he had served personally.....Mr. Leary was present.
Mr. Hopkins asked to have witnesser

out of court, and put his remonstrance in the form of an objection, asking to have it noted. He further stated that he was entitled to have the names of all witnesse called, or to be called. Mr. McSweyn said it was discretionary matter with the mag-letrare, who said the trouble was not so that although it was somewhat irregular to proceed, that the case of the defendant Found not be hampered thereby; that defendant's counsel should be furnished with sames of witnesses served, but not others. This ruling would apply to all cases brought before the court. The prosecution would be confined to such witnesses whose names had been furnished to the magistrate at commencement of court. Mr. Horkins objected and withdrew

From the case.

RICHARD LEARY was then sworn and exmined by Mr. McSwayn, said.—He knew
the Daly house as a place of general resort,
for the travelling public. Called frequently at such places as the Daly house: was
there several times between May let and
June Jth. Had taken several drinks at
the counter or bar. Had treated a friend of two there—asked for whiskey and beer—asometimes a cigar. Was told they had seither whiskey or beer. Was supplied with some noft drinks. Ginger ate or pop of mixed drinks. Could not away poster. Yely that he got a cigar of arrange plants. fely that he got a glass of strong sie, at dates mentioned in summons. Would not

thing he got was intoxicating. Supposed he may have got ale or beer, but could not

he may have got ale or beer, but could not awear positively, possibly it was of that mature, judging by its appearance and taste. Had no doubt but what it was ale. This happened on more than one occasion, between 1st May and 9th June. He paid for drinks himself at the bar. Could say that he had partaken of liquors at the bar, supplied by employees of the proprietor.

Mr. McSweyn addressed the court and said that in the case of witnesses who had been served and who had not attended the prosecution wished it understood that they should not close. Even if the case hadbeen proved by witnesses who had respected the law and attended, the case for the prosecution would not be closed until all witnesses had been subposeed had attended. It would be a bad precedent that witnesses could refuse to appear when called on, and that such refusal should seem to be countenanced. This line of action would be carried out by the prosecution in all cases. The court adjourned until Tuesday of this week. Machine Needles and Domestic Patterns.

Mr. J. B. SMITH for defendant McCon-

nell asked for an adjournment until the week following. In the meantime a prohi-

week following. In the meantime a prohibition had been asked for to prevent the court from acting in this case. Easy next week this point would be decided at Toronto, and certain papers relating thereto had been received.

Mr. McSweyn said that the court had assumed jurisdiction in other cases, and it was only delaying the course of justice in allowing further adjournment. For the prosecution he had decided that he would press the case.....Mr. Smith refused, as counsel for the defendant to allow defendant to be arraigned on the information....Some further interchange information...Some further interchange of opinions took place between counsel after which the court decided to adjourn the case for one week.

The case of Edward Daly was taken up on Tuesday morning having been adjourned from Friday of last week.

A. H. MELVILLE sworn, examined by Mr. McSweyn, said he knew the premises called the Daiy house hotel and judged it was fitted up as hotels usually are. Saw the usual appliances on the premises between 1st May and 5th June. Mr. Daly, defendant, seemed to have the direction of affairs about the hotel. He could not say whether he had taken sie or intoxicating liquors on the premises between dates given. Adthe pramises between dates given. Admitted taking what was called whiskey since let of May, but would not state definitely that it was whiskey. It was a mixed drink sometimes called "cronk" and "movie" several out of a battle. No doubt "moxie" served out of a bottle. No doubt the drinks served were to a more or less extent intoxicating. McEvoy, Waters and Mr. Daly waited on customers at the bar. This closed the evidence for the procecu-

tion. The case was left over by Magistrate O'Leary for judgment until 2 o'clock p.m. The Case against John Maunder. After some discussion by counsel as to procedure witnesses were called and this

case proceeded with. Wm. PRESTON, sworn, examined by Mr. McSweyn, said he had been sway from McSweyn, said he had been sway from Lindsay for a few days. Left town two weeks ago during June. Was at the hotel between 1st May and 5th June. Had drinks at the hotel between 24th May and 5th June. He asked for beer and they gave him "cronk"—said they had no beer. Was served by one of the Bradshaw boys. Saw Mr. Maunder around the house. Had several drinks of cronk during above dates. Commenced drinking cronk about that time. Would not swear that it wasn't beer nor that it was cronk that he drank. Did not think it had the taste of beer although it was of a pale brown colour and foamed. not think it had the taste of beer although it was of a pale brown colour and foamed. Paid for the drinks several times. Got no liquor in any other part of the house. The cronk served seemed about the same as he got at other places. Thought he got cronk but it had no effect on him. Got ginger ale and soda water. Would swear that to his knowledge he got nothing intoxicating between the lat of May and 5th June.

PATRICK DORIS was sworn, examined by Mr. McSweyn, said he had boarded at the Central house for several years and paid his money to Mr. Maunder. He had noticed Mr. Maunder, his son and Harring. ton at different times looking after the bar. Also saw J. Bradshaw at the bar. Did not see any whiskey drank about the house since May 1st but had taken several glasses since May let out neat taken several glasses of something supposed to take the place of whiskey and woke up the next morning never more soler in his life.

Thos. STINSON was sworn and gave evidence that he had drank cronk at the barries of the conditions of the state of the sta

and that he didn't like the taste of the drink at all. He had his own private supply of liquor at home and did not need to go

to public houses for it.

This closed the evidence for the prosecution. The case was adjourned for one week.
