Prices may be on the low side, but as the harvest is an abundant one a great deal of golden grain will soon be turned into dollars. The policy of holding for a rise is not generally safe or wise. Many successful farmers report that it does not pay to hold grain and to specplate on the market. Harloy is generally sold early in the season in order to take advantage of lower lake freights and in anrance, The market will soon take definite figures, and a brisk grain trade may be expected.

THE PROVINCIAL VOTERS'

The provincial votors' lists are now being published. Persons whose names have been improperly left off can have them inserted by the county judge, if the proper legal notice be given to the clark of the municipality. ambitions Battenburg prince who declined to be a more Russian agent, and who was trying with considerable success to united Bulgarian kingdom, A "revolution," evidently engineered by Bussian agents, occurred the other day, and Mexander of Bulgaria was summoned from his bed and hastened away to a point in Russian territory. Heappears to have had not the least suspicion of the plot against ion, and to have been quite helpless, Most of the Bulgarian people as well as most of the army are loyal to Mexander, and opposed to Russian influence; and a counterrevolution in favor of the deposed prince is now in progress. The solving and deposition of the prince have been planned

and carried out by Russia, in violation of the treaty of Berlin, but evidently with the tacit connivance of Austria and Ger-No vigorous remonstrances have been made by these powers at Russia's insolent aggression. They expect to share in the spoil in the division of the Turkish empire; or else Prince Alexander has been ernelly sacrificed to gratify the cear's wounded self-love. The Russian not has brought the voxed Eastern question into a critical state. Is England to do the lighting while the other powers look on! They probably would not object if Engsland were to pour out blood and money to impress upon the Russians a deeper idea

of the sacrodness of treaty obligations.

The Intest telegrams state that a counter revolution has been carried out by the Bulgarian soldiers and people, and the reroluntary provisional government that deposed Alexander has been in its turn deposed. The indignant people and soldiery want Prince Alexander back again. He is popular with all classes in Hulgaria. He lies incurred the cear's enmity, however, and it is considered doubtful if the over would consent to his return even if the the Hulgarian assembly should again elect him. The plane for the new Ontarto parliament buildings have been accepted, and tenders are asked for construction. A sketch of the building was recently published in the Clober and it would seem that the edifice will be a credit to the province and the city. A due regard for coording has been observed, and the cost is not to exceed \$750,000. Suitable buildings for the province have long been needed, and the step decided on by the covernment will be the most desirable and pronomical for the province. The old buildings required a large expenditure for renairs and were never comfortable. safe or health). A fire would destroy documents of more value to the province than the outlay involved in the construction of new buildings. No expense will be spared to make the latter fire-proof. The site is in Queen's park, at the head of College avenue.

THE PREMIER AND THE HORSE-THIEF.

A curious and interesting letter from Sir John Macdonald to one "Coffin" Macdonald, a notorious horse-thief and bur. glar, was found on the person of the latter when arrested recently near Belleville. The authenticity of the document is admitted by the Mail; and as it appears, from its peculiar surroundings, to have historical importance, we here place it on record before our readers:-

" OTTAWA, OCE, 24, '85, "Sin." I have to acknowledge four letter of the 21st October, in which you tell me that son oan give me some information respecting a private meeting held against me at Toronto. I shall be in Ottawa next week, and will be obliged by sour writing me privately sour information. It is scarcely worth your while to come down here on the subject. Yours, etc., "Joury A. Macdonald."

It is an open secret that meetings of linguated conservatives were held in Toronto in the summer of 1885 "against" Mir John as leader; and it is supposed that the premier employed "Coffin" to keep the disaffected under surveillance. Sir John may not have known that "Coffin was a horse-thief and burglar; and if he did it is of little consequence, except to the feelings of those who were subjected to the espionage. Mir John knew the kind of men he was dealing with; and sucseeded in nipping their plans in the bud, "Coffin" Macdonald did not go to Ottawa for pretty much the same reason that John O'Donoghue did not- the time was not "opportune;" and it would have "destroyed his usofulness" to have been seen in too close proximity to the premier's residence. The letter throws a curious and furid light upon the Dominion premier's peculiar methods; though it does not possess the intrinsic latte of the famous O'Donoghue epistle.

He polled 4,404 votes against 1,258 for McGregor and 1,499 for Jackes. Mr. Jackes was a very popular liberal, who was elected by a majority of 4,780 to the last parliament, and was considered so strong that nobody could beat him. But the G. O. M. did; and now the G. O. M's. candidate has beaten him a second time. cotland still stands by Mr. Gladstone in his desire to do full justice to Ireland.

The Port Hope Times says: "We cannot see that it makes any difference shether Sir John is an Orangemen or Roman Catholic." It does not and should not make any difference; but Sir John and his organs in one part of the country for political effect are declaring "that he ever set foot in an Orange lodge," while he Mail and other (Intario organs are for olitical effect maintaining that he is a steadast Orangemen and a staunch "defender | ... of the faith." So it is with Sir John. He is a stiff Protestant in one province and a good Catholic in another; but he works for the old man-

There have been great complaints made by the emperance people as to the remissness of the provincial authorities in enforcing the law, but considering how the matter stands. that is hardly to be wondered at. The law is defective in important respects, and the Dominion parliament have refused to make the necessary amendments. Conequently, any government undertaking to carry it out will do so at a disadvantage, and might incur unpopularity and loss of prestige for failures of justice for which they were in no way responsible. fact that the legislation on the question is n the hands of one government while the dministration falls within the sphere of he other, is an additional evidence of the radical imperfections of our system, and the need for a thorough revision and closer definition of the powers of the central and provincial governments.

Montreal Herald: "The Mail continues ts efforts to raise a war of races between the French and the English of the prorince of Quebec, and it does so by publishng letters from an alleged English-speaking liberal in this province. It may suit the conservative organ to abuse its former friends and attribute to them unnumbered evils, but the question arises in every mind, why was not this said before? The Catholic clergy have not suddenly become aggressive; if they are carrying on a peace ful crusade to expatriate the English of Lower Canada, and if it is necessary, as the Mail's friend in effect puts it, to break up the system of confederation and resort to legislative union to destroy the power of the French clergy, why has the Mail been so long finding it out?
