Campbell, the inepector, has a field of labor at once laborious and expensive. Long distances have to be traversed and that at great disadvantage owing to the railway communications being had. For this extensive charge he receives the munificent salary of \$300, he receives the munificent salary of \$300, with \$50 for expenses, etc., a sum, we understand, absorbed by the first three weeks of his duties.
