Although there has been no tangible improvement in the condition of the cattle trade the sentiment is somewhat better, but it failed to take any definite shape. The tone of our cables, says the Montreal Gazette, has a steady expression at the low prices now current, one reason for which was the smaller arrivals from Canada and the United States, which, however, reached fair proportions. At the same time there were continued receipts from our own quarters and the total supplies offered were fully equal to the requirements of buyers, even though they exhibited more disposition to buy at lower prices.
