Sir Edward Thornton was not sufficiently anti-Russian to suit his party. Sir William White, who sueceeds Sir Edward Thornton, is a master of the Eastern question, perhaps better quali-fied than any other English diplomatist to meet the Russians and Turks on their own ground.....It was rumored that the Porte refuses to receive Sir William White as successor to Sir Edward Thornton, an op-position which is attributed to the czar's influence, as Sir William White is strongly anti-Russian. This has been officially denied ... A St. Petersburg paper says that Russis has still to deal with English in-trigue and Battenburgism in Russis.... Nova Vremya says: Of all the signers of the Berlin treaty England alone seems inclined to oppose Russis's Bulgarian policy. Russia must know whether England's intention is serious in order to prepare herself to take measures accordingly, as Russia will not be brought to a standstill by

England's veto.

-Some clear and interesting comments on the Bulgarian embroglio are made by the Paris correspondent of the Montreal Witness: That honey-combed colossus, Russia, has within herself the elements of herown ruin. -Dublin United Ireland says no power in Great Britain can collect the "landlord's tribute" in Ireland in face of an organized, united and level-headed people... The Catholic bishops assembled at Maynooth have sent a memorial to the English government urging the adoption of temporary messures to relieve the Irish tenantry and prevent the outrages which they resort to in simple desperation.... The troops engaged in the Woodford evictions on their return to the barracks at Birr protested against the work of forcibly putting helpsheiter into the roadway, and declared they would in future refuse to perform such an would in future refuse to perform such an obnoxious duty. No effort on the part of their superior officers could quiet the determined indignation of the soldiers, some twenty of whom were placed under arrest on a charge of mutiny.... A Dublin cable of the 8th inst. says: In consequence of the enforcement of evictions on the property of the Marquis of Classicarde at Woodford, Co. Galway, the sentiment of the entire county has become inflamed. Notices have been posted urging tradesmen to abstain from furnishing the police and others who have assisted in evictions and others who have assisted in evictions with supplies of any kind, and to a large extent these appeals have been complied with. The police have torn the bills down, but they have been replaced by others, and the tree trunks, gate posts, walls, fences, etc., are covered with them. Twenty-one risoners were remanded at Waterford yesterday charged with pouring boiling water mixed with lime on the heads of the police and balliffs, and the town is in a fever of excitement. Men are flocking in from all parts of the country, many of them armed, in readiness for defence in case of attack by police and possibly for offensive use.....The conference of the Catholic bishops at Maynooth adopted resolutions declaring that the Irish people appreciated Mr. Gladetone's efforts on behalf of Ireland and they still adhered to their demand for home rule, and ladige nantly delived the tory assertions that if the Irish people were allowed to govern themselves in domestic affairs the Catholic majority would abuse the power conferred on the Irish parliament and harass the Protestants of the country. The resolu-tions further declare that the troubles and disorder in both Ireland and Great Britain will not cease until Ireland's right to administer her own laws is recognized.
