The division yesterday showed a remarkable record. Every conservative had either voted or paired and there was not a single absentee. "Let me tell you," continued Lord Salisbury, "the conditions of discouragement are very serious. Prisoners condemued to labor know nothing like the misery and discomfort a member of the house of commons undergoes through a night of 'Irish obstruction.' Irish obstructionists have greatly changed in character. Formerly they meant to secure, and perhape they were not to be blamed for their efforts to obtain, a long discussion, a complete threshing and eifting of the subject. They carry their opposition to the utmost possible length today, but this opposition in skilful hands is something totally different from their former methods. It is an instrument of torture to compel a majority of government by mere physical suffering to concede this or that. Whatever the obstructionists set their hearts on the majority must stand and listen, not to arguments or exhortations, but to elaborate efforts to waste time, which are made merely for the purpose of keeping the majority up night after night in the hope that from shere fatigue they will concede something which they know public duty compels them to refuse. (Cries of shame.) If a representative government is to continue, he said, this instrument of freedom in the world. 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
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
