COMMUNICATIONS

The Action of Foresto on Approxituate [To the Editor of THE CANADIAN POST.]
Str.—I have been asked to state condi-

ly, with a view to its publication through the prese, thus reaching a larger circle of readers than will peruse blue books or red of doing so without asking too tor., I have stated a few here, and should he glad if, in the interest of the forestry movement (which is, in view of the great harm over-clearing is doing our agriculture, the chief need of Ontario) you will give it a place in your columns.

The reasons for maintaining forests are: That they hold the rain in their beds, which are formed of a deep mass of leaves and decayed forest refuse. (This is so long

which are formed of a deep mass of leaves and decayed forest refuse. (This is so long as the forest is kept free from grass. If cattle be allowed to tramp it hard and grass overspread it, it will not retain nearly se much, and will be to that extent inferior in value as a reservoir of moisture to the farm lands around.) This water so held filters off slowly through the surrounding lands and keeps creeks, rivers and the numerous underground channels of the earth supplied with water, which furnishes moisture thus to the whole country. If there be no woods, rain flows off at once to the rivers, washing away much good earth in its progress, and being of very slight beneficial effect compared to what it is in the former case.

That they, in the season of growth, when showers of rain are needed, being then possessed of vast quantities of leaves, which throw out much moisture daily, this moisture being the lightest of all vapors, send large quantities of it upward to the higher atmosphere. Being cooler than the air-currents above, when it meets one sufficiently damp the puncture of the warm and cooler bodies immediately must produce precipitation, and rain must fall at some point, whether nearer or further depending on the speed of the wind then existing. That woods or even single lines of evergreens exert a powerful influence by way of shelter, thus, that when a shower of rain has moistened the ground, that land will sid vegetation rapidly so long as the moisture is evaporating from the surface, for all that time the land will be neither too wet nor too dry, and the moisture will not be stagnant, which is injurious, but in motion, when it is beneficial. When there is no shelter the drying winds pass over too rapidly and the benefit of the shower does not remain in the land for half the time it beneficially might.

That the shelter of trees in lines or blocks

is very valuable to winter crops in prevent-ing the uneven drifting of snow and otherwise, and that this is very important with reference to the growth of clover, which is the principal means of keeping in good tilth many of our Ontario soils.

These are but a few of the reasons. The cheapest methods of obtaining these advantages are first, to preserve a piece of the original ferest on each farm, which I have known done effectually simply by fencing the piece desired to preserve and keeping cattle out; and next, by planting long lines of evergreens as windbreaks. keeping cattle out; and a window long lines of evergreeens as windows long lines of evergreeens as windows is to plant about the first of June and keep the roots quite damp and covered from an and windfill planted.—Yours truly.

THE SCOTT ACT IN HURON.

The Mail's Scott act correspondent has been in Huron, and his impressions of things are given in a letter. . . . With the exception of one or two points the correspondent gives a very faithful representation of the workings of the Scott act in this county, and the causes which have operated and still operate against its success. He is in error, however, in suppos ing that the fact of many people looking upon the Scott act se a stepping stone to The Oldest and the Leading Life Office in robibition is one prominent reason why the Scott act is not more rigidly enforced. Every person who would aid in enforcing a general prohibitory measure will now aid in enforcing the Scott act. The act has within it the elements of total prohibition in the territory which it covers; all that it wants is to be operated, and we are much afraid that in any district where the Scott act is a failure a prohibitory law, no matter how sweeping, would be equally a failure it it rested with the people to enforce it. force it. What is wanted to make the Scott act effective is machinery to enforce it. That machinery, however, will cost money, and while the people would like not cost anything, their prohibition sentiment is not sufficiently deep-rooted to reach their pockets. At least that is our experience in this county.

Another omission made by the correspondent is in failing to distinguish between the two governments. When

tween the two governments. When the act first came into operation it was under the jurisdiction of the Dominion government. The officials whose conduct he describes were appointed by the Dominion government, were responsible to the Dominion government, were responsible to the Dominion government and were acting under it. When the privy council decided that the liquor question came within the jurisdiction of the provincial authorities the faithless officials were dismissed and others appointed by the Ontario government, who are in sympathy with the act, and the druggists' licenses were taken from the hotel-keepers and given to those whom the law contemplated should have them.
