Russia is hard at work on two railways, which she fondly believes England has not been informed of, but which the war office here is watching care-

fully. One of these is from Vladikaukas, the present terminus of the north Caucasus road across the mountains to Tiffis, where it will tap the Poti-Baku line. This will be finished at the latest in August, 1888.
The other milway, which is intended to supplement this when the winter has dosed the Caucarus passes, is a vast trestle-work from Astrakan down the delts of the Volgs to a deep water point where the Caspiss never freezes. This, which will be available to ship troops down to Baku when the Tiffia route is snowed up, will be ready in June 1888. This means nothing more nor less than an attack in force on India. For this reason English statesmen are anxious to forestast all the Muscovite and cripple him before his lines are completed. The undoubted presence of Italy in the combination alone suffices to show the magnitude of the scheme which Lord Salisbury is pushing, into which Austria has been forced, and which Prince Bismarck winks at. Italy would not be so enthusiastic on the side of her ancient enemy, Austria, if she had not one eye clearly fixed on profit elsewhere. in June 1888. This means nothing



Lord Salisbury's trump card which he still holds back is to induce the Sobranje to recall Alexander. It is said that the queen is very anxious for this to be done, and has convinced the prince that he ought to go if Bismarck will allow him. If he resolves upon peace at this late moment and can restrain the exar, the embroglio may still wear itself out in diplomatic palaver and be patched up by a congress for another year or two. 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
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
