An Able and Eloquent Lecture. On Tuesday evening Hon. J. B. Finch, the amous American advocate of temperance, delivered a lecture in the opera house. The house was crowded, and on the platform were Judge Dean, chairman, Revs. Mesers. McTavish, Pearson and Anderson, and Mesers.S. A. McMurtry, J. Keith and R. Smyth. At eight o'clock the chairman in a few brief sentences introduced Hon. J. B. Finch, who at once took up the subject and delivered during two hours time a speech the equal of which for elaquence and power has seldom been heard in Lindsay. His arguments in favor of the cause of prohibition were apparently unanswerable, and the illustrations were pointed, amusing and instructive. He advocated temperance legislation, and strongly pressed upon the temperance body the importance of voting from principle irrespective of party, saying that the right to vote carried with it the duty to vote, and if a man voted for a party instead of from principle he was guilty of dishonesty. In a most fervent peroration Hon. Mr. Finch concluded and was tendered a hearty vote of thanks, moved by Rev. Mr. Jones and seconded by Rev. Dr. McTavish. Hon. Mr. Finch in reply said he should best receive their thanks by their work in the cause, and seked the young men and women to band themselves together in temperance societies and the business men to help with their means.
