The local government board has notified the New Ross hoard of guardians that un-less they abandon the use of a special ward for this purpos, which was created by them in obedience to the command of the nationalist leaders, who say the local government board seek to convert the worklouses into garrisons against landlords, hey will be suspended, and vice-guardians appointed instead to carry out the beheats

of the officials.

-A London cable of Saturday last says: fo-night's reports from Ireland state that the rent movement, instead of beingcheeked, as anticipated by the Dublin castle officials, as the result of the proceedings sgainst John Dillon, continues to spread, if possible, with increased rapidity. The difsiculty of the leaders, as stated in private telegrams from them to-night, is to restrain rather than stimulate the tenants. The latter in many places are for forcing a rup-ture, while the league prefers to exhaust every effort to arrive at an amicable settle-ment with the landlords. The opinion is rapidly spreading among the tenants that their leaders will in a short time be imprisoned; that the government prosecutions will be so strained as to prevent justice being done, and that the national league will be suppressed. This has contributed largely to making the movement of 1886 the most effective ever known in Ireland, and is daily bringing hundreds of fresh recruits into the national camp. If the government is so misguided as to prove by its action that these dark anticipations are well founded, the end of it will be the ir retrievable ruin of the landlords. It will retrievable ruin of the landlords. It will be too late to draw back when coercive measures have once been adopted as the deliberate policy of the government. Nor will the cabinet even be allowed a chance to pass the proposed land purchase bill as an escape from the dilemma into which they have been suffering the landlords to

drive them, if repression is to prevail. The drive nem, it represents to prevail. The liberals are pledged to oppose the proposed tory settlement of the purchase question whenever it comes up. The Parnellites will be fully justified at that time in joining the liberals in opposition to the measure, because the settlement of the land question by the tenants themselves, without help furnished by the government than that offered by a coercive policy, is certain. In any case, the next session of parliament will be the stormiest known for many years. All parties agree on that point. The government is in for a row, no matter what course they adopt. Whether they give precedence to the cloture or coercion what course they adopt. The proposed warfare, the telegram asserts, will include proclamations of all league meetings and arrests of the prominent anti-rent agitators. It may be a new idea to some poultry preeders, this one of feeding clover chaft to poultry during the winter, but many breeders feed large quantities of it each season. On every farm where clover hay is made and fed, large quantities of the chaff collect on the barn floor. This should be gathered up daily and put away in a barrel or box for the poultry to use, the fine pieces of heads and leaves which compose the chaff being the choicest part of the hay the chaff being the choicest part of the hay the poultry will eat quantities of this dry, if it is supplied in conveniently arranged ooxes, so made as to prevent the birds from wasting it. The best way to feed the finest portion of it is with the mixed feed. They relish it exceedingly, and it goes far toward taking the place of green food, which is not siways obtained during the mixed months. Montreal, has addressed the following circular to the trade, and as the matter is of great interest to farmers we place it before our readers. Poultry is one of the most important productions of the farm, and instead of being left to grow of itself, should have enlightened and enterprising sttention:-

Dressed poultry is now finding its way

Dressed poultry is now finding its way to this market—in small quantities, however, as yet—and any lots arriving here are very promptly disposed of at prices ranging as follows:—Say turkeys, 9 to 10 cents; decks, 9 to 10 cents; chickens, 7 to 3 cents; geese, 6 to 7 cents.

The saving effected by the manner in which poultry is dressed for this market (as given below) is an important consideration in comparing our market values with the prices offered by American buyers. The extra labor and the loss of weight entailed by dressing pountry to suit the American markets—the head, feet, wings, tail feathers and entrails being removed—make it necessary that they should command about one-third more in price, in order to equal in value the same nountry dressed to suit this market. In other words, turkeys dressed to suit our market, and seld at 9 cents, is about equal to the same turkeys dressed to suit the American markets, and sold at 12 cents.

In order to obtain full market value for consignments of poultry to the Montreal market, the following instructions should be carefully observed:

"Do not feed for 24 hours previous to killing. Bleed well and pluckclean, leaving on the head, also the wings and tail feathers in. Entrails should not be drawn, neither should the poultry be scalded. It is easily detected, and means from one to three cents per pound reduction in value. When perfectly cool (do not freeze them) pack firmly in nice, clean cases, holding from one to two hundred pounds. Mark each case with correct weights—grees, tare and nett.
