Betting at Elections - Beware of Traps. Several new clauses respecting betting and other practices at elections have been enacted since the last general election. As regards betting the law now appears to be

follows:—

1. It is a corrupt practice for a candidate to bet on the result of the election in which he is engaged or on the majority in any part of the electoral division, or on any event relating to the election.

2. It is a corrupt practice for the candidate, or any other person, to provide money to be used in betting upon any election or any event connected therewith.

3. It is a corrupt practice for any person to bet with a view to influence the election or any event relating thereto.

A corrupt practice or an illegal act not only disqualifies an elector but renders him liable to heavy penalties and imprisonment.


