Communications to the Grand Trusts. Reliwey Co. from the council were on metion reads first time and the council went into committee of the whole, Mayor Densons offering some explanation referrings to the newly organized board of trade of Lindsay and to an informal meeting of the council held a short time ago, at which Mr. J. T. Machin for the Grand Trunk rallway had addressed the council. The question of the rallway warehouses came up and was discussed. Some communications based on the opinion of the council at the meeting noted were made to the general manager of the Grand Trunk rallway at Montreal, and it was to ratify the propositions made in those communications that the metter was now taken up. Briefly stated, it was proposed by the town council that should the company place the proposed engine sheds and shops at Lindsay that right of way—possibly a free lot—use of a street and no increase of taxes on their improvements would be ensured the company. In reply to this proposition it was learned that it was viewed favorably by the railway authorities, Some suggestions were also incorporated in the resolution with reference to alternations of grade along the line of rails on Victoriaswe, as desired by the railway authorities, whereby should alternation be made that property holders should be remuerated and the council be made free from liability to ratepayers on this account.

WEST VICTORIA TEACHERS ASSOCIATION.

Semi-Aunual Convention at Fencies Falls The semi-sonnal convention of the teach ern of Went Victoria was held at Fenelon Falls on Thursday and Friday, Dec. 2nd and 3rd. He spoke of the extension of 3rd class certificates by the minister of education, by county hoards and by inspectors. Only two had been granted by the minister for 1886; none by the inspector except in the Parry Sound district; the county board granted extension third-class certificates, but only upon the candidates passing again the 3rd class examination of some higher examina, tion. The board had no choice but to grant them, He pointed out the great advancement of education in the county in sixteen years, as shown by the entrance examinations, which are much harder than the 3rd class examination was then. He mentioned Edglish grammar and mental arithmetic an the weak audjects in the schools of West Victoria, but this was owing largely to the fault of the text books. He closed by pointing out the great advantage to teacher and pupil of strict government and urged teachera leaving their schools not to relax in the least until after four o'clock on the last

least until after four o'clock on the last day.


