BERLIN, Jan. 29. - The continued concentration of Austrian troops in Galicia, the huge transportation of war material thither adds uneasiness in financial circles. There are also other indications. R-inforcements have arrived at Dienze, Hagenau and other frontier posts in Germany. An Aleace journal reports that the French are building parracks at Gerardmoi to accommonate 3,000 men, and at Corcieux for 3,000 more, and that at other places in the Vosges smaller barracks are being erected.

St. PRIERSBUGH, Jan. 29. - The Journal de St. Peteraburg, commenting on the attitude of Great Britain with respect to for eign affairs, as revealed by the proceedings at the opening of parliament, says that it could not expect from the Marquie of Salis' bury any sounder or more equitable view of Russia's intentions than that which he condescended to make in the house of lords on Thursday. Lord Randolph Churchill's statement, the Journal says, would enable Russia to form an opinion concerning Lord Salisbury's unawerving pacific policy. Referring to Bulgaria, the Journal says it is impossible for Russia to treat with the regency. The regotiations between Russia and the Porte, may, however, the paper thinks, result in an arrangement based on Russia's programme for the formation of a government in Bulgaria with whom Russia can treat.
