Rallway Notes.

Surveys and plans, says the Peterborough Examiner, have been completed for the con junction, connecting the main line of the Midland with the Grand Junction by way of the locks. The new stretch of road extends from the Midland main line at where the latter crosses the C. P. R. on Townsendst to the Grand Junction at Downer's corner's. The line, which will be about two miles in length, passes through the south-eastern portion of the town, crosses the river about the locks on an iron bridge reating on stone abutments, and joine the Grand Junction, as before stated, at Downer's Corners.
