Smith and soldiers of the salvation army come along Kent-st. to do business precisely as much so as the farmer. Both are equally ruled by a purpose purely in keeping with the nature of each. The first one wants money, the other seeks the salvation of souls. In either case is the by-law broken? I say no. Neither party interferes with traffic by their standing. They are not in either case suspicious persons. They are not loafers, idlers or loiterers. If I understand the spirit of the by-law as it was referred to by Col. loafers, idlers or loiterers. If I understand the spirit of the by-law as it was referred to by Col. Deacon as it now exists in its amended form, suspicion in some degree must exist before it is alive. It is against loafers, idlers and loiterers; and not at all against any religious citizen of our town who may require the use of Kent-st. for secular or religious purposes so long as they do all in line with God's law laid down in the bible and do not impede or interfere with the traffic.
