It is suspected that they are plotting for a general rising. The revolutionary movement is believed to have received an enormous impetus by the recent arrests. Branches of the revolutionary societies are stated to have been established in all of the principal towns and the movement is rapidly extending to the most remote parts of the country. It is believed that in many districts the nobility are leading the movement. The force of the agents of the secret police detailed to watch over the cz:r's residence at Gats chins is now so large that the palace is completely surrounded and the entire vicinity is placed under surveilance night and day.
