The Horse Markets.

The Montreal horse market continues quite active and during the past week there were shipped from here to the United States 166 horses, valued at \$19,235.50, or an average of \$115.87 each. They were en-tered in the office of the American consul

The Live Stock Markets. The arrivals of live stock at Point St. Charles since last Friday were 219 cattle, 50 horses, twenty-four calves, 16 sheep and to market and prices are about 5c per lb. Toronto Farmers' Market.

The receipts of grain on the street Wed nesday were small and pricessteady. Ahout Peas nominal at 51c to 52c. Hay in moderate supply and prices firm, with sales of 25 loads at \$13 to \$15.50 a ton for timothy, and at \$9 to \$12 for clover. Straw firm, six loads selling at \$9.50 to \$10.50. Hogs firm at \$6.70 to \$6.85. Beef, \$3 to \$4.50 for fore-quarters, and \$5.50 to \$7 for hindquarters. Mutton, \$5 to \$6.50. Lamb, \$7 to \$8.—

The receipts of cattle at the Toronto mar ket are fair and prices generally steady.
The demand continues good from Buffalo,
the shipments being butchers' cattle. They sell at life to life per ih., the latter for those weighing 1,230 lbs. There is nothing new with regard to the export trade. British advices are now very encouraging, and the general price for Canadian steers in Liverpool is 5\d. Milch cows are dull, ruling at \$20 to \$45 a head. Several loads of the best butchers' cattle sold at 3\cdot to 3\dagger to 3\dagger c, and small lots of choice at 32c to 37c. Quotations are as follows:—First-class butchers', Sic to Sic; second-class Sc to Sic; and third-class, Sic to Sic; Sheep in fair supply, with sales at 40 %6 a head.
