THE NEW RAILWAY.—Mr. C. J. Pusey, the managing director of the Irondale, Bancroft and Ottawa railway, explained the

the managing director of the Irondale, Bancroft and Ottawa railway, explained the new railway project to a few leading citizens last Tuesday afternoon. The line was to run between Orillia and Ottawa. Teamiles had already been constructed near the eastern end, and the company proposed to commence operations at the western terminue, Orillia, as soon as arrangements could be made. They expected to get a grant of \$3,300 per mile from the Dominion government and bonuses from all the municipalities the line passed through. They would only ask small bonuses but expected every place on the route to assist them. The money would not be collected until after the road was built. They had no intention of carrying the road further than Orillia and expected to remain an independent line. If the scheme is viewed by the people in a favorable light, the whole 200 miles of proposed railway would be completed with the least possible delay,—work being carried on from west to east. The new railway would open up immense iron mines, which will furnish the best pig iron, and steel as good as the world can produce. A good agricultural district, containing nearly 74 per cent of available land would be opened up for settlement. Pine and other timber was valuable and plentiful slong the route.
