The work of the first session of the sixth parliament of Ontario was brought to a close at a quarter past five o'clock Saturday morning. The last night was the most eventful one of the session. The attorney general's home rule resolutions provoked a keen and at times acrimonious debate. With the tone of the attorney general's speech or with the wording of the resolutions no fau't could be found. The object of the government was to submit a form of motion which would secure the unanimous assent of the house. But in this they were not successful. It has been apparent for some time that Mr. Meredith has wholly surrendered to his Orange following, and he proved it beyond all question during the debate of Saturday morning. He has never made a better speech in the assumbly. But it was uncompromising in its hostility to the resolutions and was even more pronounced in its Orange lavor than that of Mr. E. F. Clarke of aranta, county master and recognized Orange leader in the house. But Mr. Meredith had but a beggirly support when the resolution. DITCHES AND WATERCOURSES. The important amendments to the the session provide that only the lands within fifty rods on either side of a drain constructed under the set shall be assessed constructed under the set shall be assessed for the cost of the work, and only so much within fitty rods as will be benefit that, and only in proportion to the benefit that will be conferred; that drains may be covered under prescribed conditions; that where live owners are concerned a drain shall not be commenced except with the oddsent of a majority of them or under resolution of the council; and that any municipality may appoint an inspector of drains and ditches in order to insure the proper protection and maintenance of drainage works.

The farmers of the assembly have had a number of important meetings during the session, the outcome of which has been the organization of a permanent sesociation. Mr. Drury of East Simcoe has been elected president; Mr. Bishop of South Huron, secretary; and Mr. Sprague of Prince Edward, Mr. Dryden of South Ostario, Mr. Fell of East Victoria, Mr. Gibson of East Huron and Mr. Cruess of West Victoria are the executive committee. It is intended that the association shall re-ceive representations from the farmers' unions all over the province and take organized action for their consideration by the legislature. And, doubtless, in many other respects the association will find means of promoting the interests of agriculture. The members directing the DOINGS OF THE ONTARIO LEG- movement are a guarantee that it is not merely an association for the distribution of offices.

MUNICIPAL AMENDMENTS. As usual the municipal law has be

extensively amended. The qualification

for municipal office has been reduced to \$200 freehold and \$400 lessehold, in villages, \$100 freehold and \$800 lessehold in townships, \$600 freehold and \$1,200 leasehold in towns, and \$1,000 freehold and 32,000 lessehold in cities. A person entitled to vote but in default of payment of tixes may exercise the franchise on producing a certificate from the collector or treasurer that the taxes have since been paid. Where a deputy-returning officer refuses to act another appointment may he made by the returning officer. The receipt by a voter of a hallot paper within a polling booth shall be prima facts evidence that he has there voted.
