W. M. Robeon, Lindsay, in the Canadian Hor-Str.-I was much pleased with Mr. J. H. Wismer's description of the Chinese Peony in February number. It was short, captivating and convincing. Its merits seem great enough to create a desire to become a possessor of this beautiful perennial. But I was sorry to hear the unfavorable report of the Prentise Grape received from the association; for with me in Lindsay, smong my different kinds, which number is the teens, it has been my special pride and pleasure to show friends and visitors this grape. About four years ago I planted this and a few others, then new kinds, including Lady Washington, Duchess Jefferson, Brighton, Moore's Early and Iona. They have all grown luxuriantly and fruit. ed very well the last two seasons. But of white grapes the Prentiss has been my favorite-the bunches are so attractive, uniform and compact. The quality, I think, may be classed among the best, and just early enough to ripes its fruit here. In my opinion the famed Niagara has in this no mean competitor for first place among white grapes. Right alongside of this vine I have a rampant growing vine with heavy foliage and heautiful name, Lady Washington. Viettorware surprised; we are all surprised at the large double shouldered bunches. They look magnificent if they would only ripes; but they have not for the past two asseous, and I am afraid they will not be a success in Lindsay. Dry earth will not freeze, and is the most perfect disinfectant, making phosphate, so to speak, entirely odorless. I use large plank boxes on runners; which a horse draws out of the buildings to the fields, once a year, and a couple of barrels of road dust is sufficient for that time. To the abominable pit system in many cases, is no doubt due the unaccountable outbreaks of diphtherra, and low typhoid fevers in what should be healthy villages and farm houses.


