His less will exceed \$100 .- Stand-JUDGE DARTNELL'S DECISION IN AN IM-PORTANT LINE FENCE CASE. - The case of Tomas vs. Rennie, heard on appeal by his honor Judge Dartnell at Cannington is of importance to farmers and especially to fence-viewers who, like many others when clothed with a little brief authority are very apt to exceed their jurisdiction and put people to heavy costs. The parties were owners of adjoining lands in the township of Brock. They and the former owners of the land had for some years, by mutual agreement, kept up one half of the line fence between their lands. The appel-lant's portion consisted of pine stumps and roots built up into fence. The evidence showed that it was reasonably fit to keep out cattle, and that similar fences were largely erected and maintained in the lolargely erected and maintained in the lo-cality. The respondent called upon the appellant to remove his stump fence and erect one similar to his own, a rail fence. Upon Rennie's refusal he called in the fenceviewers, who made an award in ac-cordance with Thomas' demands. From this award Rennie appealed. It was about on appeal that appeal from the cost shown on appeal that apart from the cost of a new fence the removal of the old fence would be both tedious and expensive.

Judge Dartnell's decision is as follows:
Section 2 defines the duties of owners and imposes upon such as are owners of adjacents and the duty of keeping up a just cent lands the duty of keeping up a just proportion of the fence which marks the boundary between them. By section 3 it is provided that if such owners cannot agree and there is a dispute between them respecifing such proportions (that is, the just proportions spoken of in section 3) the aid of the fenceviewers can be invoked in order to arbitrate in the premises, that is to, set-tle the just proportion. There is nothing in the act which seems to point out that it applies to any existing line fence. On the


