LINDSAY TOWN COUNCIL.

A Five Hour Session.

The Colored Cow By-law Passed in Broken Shape.

COMMUNICATIONS. REPORT OF CHARITY COMMITTEE REPORTS OF FIRE WARDEN AND HEALTH INSPECTOR. FINANCE AND TOWN PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORTS—THE COW BY-LAW—A FIGHT OVER THE LOCAL TRAINS—BUILDING A BARN STAND.

The regular monthly meeting of the council was held on Monday evening last. After waiting a few minutes for Mayor Walters, who stepped from the car to the mayor's chair—no to speak—business was taken up. With his words there were present: Reeves Smyth, Dep. reeve Bryane, and Couns. Connolly, H. Walters, Southon, Lennon, Mallon, Ray, G. Bryane and Crandell. Quite a crowd had gathered outside the council chamber, where they took the fresh air, until the clerk began to read the minutes, during which official proceedings the room rapidly filled up. When the minutes of council were finished the clerk produced a volume containing the minutes of meeting of the board of health, and some member having indirectly expressed a wish that these should be read, they were read accordingly. A great deal of time was then wasted in reading the list of names attached to petitions against the cow by-law, the reading being peppered with remarks from Coun. Crandell, who asserted that ratepayers—in some cases—had signed four times over in order to avoid the aggregate of names. It was after midnight before business of any serious amount had been transacted.

COMMUNICATIONS. From McIntyre & Stewart, under instructions from Mr. Herriman and Mr. James Burns, and laying complaint against Dr. Birrows, medical health officer, for interfering with Dr. Herriman in his capacity as town physician.—Referred to a special committee composed of Dep. reeve Bryane, and Couns. H. Walters, Connolly, Ray and Crandell.

From Mr. Andrew Jackson, asking that the grading on Puttiner's lot, east of the railway, be completed at an early day.—Referred to the street and bridge committee.

From Samuel Parvine, applying for position of sanitary inspector for 1887 at a salary of \$100 per year.—Received.

From James Wilson, applying for position of town clerk.—Applicant was appointed at a further stage of the proceedings.

From Mr. John Irvine, offering to give \$100 for three lots on Queen's square, south of Kent-st., lots 1, 2 and 3, in several instalments.—Received.

From A. Campbell and other ratepayers on William-st. asking that the William-st. be watered daily at same time as Kent-st.—Referred to committee on fire and water works by-law.

From P. J. Hurley and Thos. Brady, stating that they proposed to engage in the main business and to erect a warehouse of 200,000 cubic feet capacity, and that they would like to have the council should grant a lease of a site on the Queen's square reserve for purpose of building, and that a warehouse be put in to serve the use of the warehouse when built.—Referred to the railway and town property committee.

From A. Gullon, A. D. REPORT OF HEALTH INSPECTOR. From Mr. H. H. Brown, sanitary inspector, reporting on the sanitary state of the town and particularly the work performed in this direction. This report contained a great deal of information regarding sanitary matters, and showed that the inspector had been active in the duties assigned to him, and the facts referred to could only have been ascertained on personal inspection. The report was referred to the local board of health.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE. Coun. RAY, chairman, read a brief report from the finance committee, recommending payment of the following accounts: A. D. Mallon, wood, \$3 25; C. H. Brown, Co., \$10 00; S. H. Brown, printing, \$5 75; J. W. Thompson, Co., \$10 00; P. Tully, beer for charity, \$1 00.

As account from Dr. Birrows of \$30, for expenses to Woodstock, representing the local board of health, was referred to the board of health for approval. The report was adopted.

REPORT OF TOWN PROPERTY COMMITTEE. Deputy reeve BRYANE presented a report from this committee recommending that the offer made by John Irvine for lots on Queen square reserve be accepted. The report also recommended that a band stand be built on the site of the property, and that instructions from the council to carry out the work at once.

The adoption of the report was moved, but Coun. CONNOLLY suggested that the matter be referred to the band stand committee. He said the expenditure asked for was not a necessary expense and could be avoided.

Coun. RAY objected to selling the town property to Mr. Irvine at the price recommended in the report. The majority of the people, he was informed, were opposed to the sale of the property to Mr. Irvine. The town's property should not be sold cheaply, and would probably cost more in value in ten years. Mr. Irvine could raise the money in ten years and the council should not sacrifice the three lots at the figure named, \$1,700. The amount was not a great consideration to the town and might be largely increased in the future.

Deputy reeve BRYANE protested against taking advantage of Mr. Irvine and brought forward reasons why the sale should be made. The town's property should be sold at a profit, and the town would repay the town. Reeve SMYTH suggested that reasonable caution should be taken that the property was not sacrificed, although there was no objection to the sale of the property at an advance price of the town.
