Sturgeon Point Notes.

A terrific thunderstorm prevailed at Sturgeon Point on Wednesday night. Most people down there got up in the morning with the conviction that the town had lasted all night. As a matter of fact for two hours rain descended in sheets of water, and the lightning and thunder were almost appalling.

Sturgeon Point Hotel.

The Sturgeon Point hotel has enjoyed such an excellent increasing patronage that its facilities have on many occasions during the season been cramped at the close of the season some extensive additions will provide large additional accommodation. Railway Notes.

Four or five miles of switching and sidetracking will be put down at Lindsay in a short time to accommodate the increasing traffic. Mr. W. W. Wainwright, assistant general manager of the Grand Trunk, says in town last week looking over the extensive railway improvements laid out for this town.

The dismantled round-house of Port Hope is beginning to arrive at Lindsay by the coast, four cars coming in on Tuesday.

The new machine house, work on which has commenced, will be 250 by 65 feet, and will house thirty engines. It will stand on the "new" site in the right of the present round house, and about 100 yards south-west. Mr. Barnett, engineer of the Midland division, was at Lindsay on Monday and asked out the foundation for the building, the first sod being turned by Mr. H. J. Rainford.

"Midland" writes to the World: You mentioned lately that they are now working at three points, viz: York, Lansdowne and Coteau. I notice that neither you nor your contemporaries say anything of the new line of the Midland work. Those interested in the Midland argue that the Lansdowne section is merely a long switch for the more convenient crossing of the express trains, and that the other portions are in the meantime to relieve the existing line of traffic from the Midland and Canada Atlantic, pending the extension of the Midland to Coteau, southeast of Ottawa on the Canadian Atlantic. If that time the Sanit St. Marie road will have been completed, double track at least, and the Midland will be in a position to handle the traffic in this direction.

The steps taken by the Grand Trunk railway authorities to dismantle the round house at Port Hope for the purpose of making the brick and other material available for the construction of the new round house have now commenced. Public meetings have been held, the Midland directors were telegraphed to in protest, but they replied could do nothing under the laws of the Grand Trunk. A strong protest against the demolition of the building and the following telegraphed Mr. H. J. Rainford, and asked the following reply:

MONTREAL, 19th Inst. I will be very glad to see the committee as any time they will come here. It is not possible, however, for me to change the decision. It is based on the opinion of the committee. The company's business requires that provision be made at Lindsay for the storing of engines and the doing of work connected with them.
