 $x_{\rm opt}$. If a person orders his paper discontinued he must $x_{\rm opt}$ all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send until payment is made, and then collect the whole pount, whether the paper is taken from the office or not.

5. In suits for subscriptions, the suit may be instituted in the place where the paper is published, although the subscriber may reside hundreds of miles away.

4. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, while unpaid, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.


