PETERBORO. BROUGHT TO JUSTICE.—For some years past Mr. J. M. Lewis has entertained the complaint that his electrical supplies were disappearing more rapidly than they were made, and late events go to prove that systematic acts of robbery have been carried on in the townships at his expense. On the 13th of August four barrels of pork, three pairs of blankets, two pairs of trousers and a quantity of pole and lumber were stolen from his store at the farm of Copper Lake, in Ansonville, some 40 miles from town. The matter was placed in the hands of Detective Macpherson of Toronto, who spent eight or ten days in the vicinity, but was unable to find the culprits. Acting upon information from him, and accompanied by County Constables Geo. Cochran, Thos. Lytle, Wm. Henry and George Nichols, and an employee of Mr. Lewis, John Bell, he started for the north of Harvey and searched the premises of a couple of residents, finding a quantity of the stolen goods. With the men in whose houses the stuff had been found, Messrs. Elijah Windover and Augustine Montgomery, were brought to town, where the goods were recognized as Mr. Lewis's. At the police court on Monday evening, Mayor Stevenson presided, the prisoners were remanded until Wednesday.
