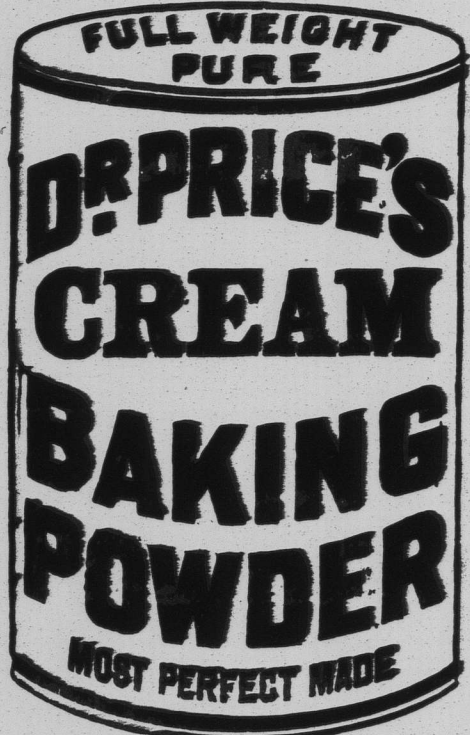

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, ONT., OCT. 21, 1887.

Business and Produce.
The local market during the week has been steady with large deliveries of barley. Prices remain firm, and good samples below 70c per bushel, with 65 to 68 for next grade lower. The crop is being marketed promptly, and sellers are satisfied with prices current.

There is a good demand for produce, butter bringing 20 cents per lb, and eggs from 17c to 18c per dozen.

A large quantity of poultry is being brought in Lindsay for shipment by Mr. W. Jack, who is sending it across the line.

The Horse Market.
The Montreal horse market is very quiet, but during the early part of the week there was a fair trade for common horses. There were sent to the United States black ones costing \$5, \$11.

Montreal Live Stock Markets.
The supply of cattle at Montreal on Monday was not large. Brokers asked higher rates and buyers were slow to purchase. Some of the cattle from Calgary have been bought by butchers, though it is probable most of them will be shipped to Britain. Superior cattle from 10 to 12 sheep and lambs are not so numerous. Prices range from \$3 to \$5 for sheep and \$2 to \$3 for lambs. Cows are scarce and higher. Hogs in fair supply at about 50c.

Life Matches at Peterborough.

On Monday and Tuesday of this week the annual matches of the Peterborough rifle association were held. Contestants present made some fine shooting, notably Mr. H. Cameron, who made at the 100 yard range eight consecutive bulls eyes. Messrs. J. A. Williamson, J. H. Oliver and J. Robinson of Lindsay participated in such of the matches as were open to those outside the county of Peterborough. Mr. J. A. Williamson carried off first in the extra series match, fourth in the county match, third in the association match. The other Lindsay men were not successful.

An Interesting Debate.

In the assembly room of the Y. M. C. A. on Tuesday evening of this week was debated the following subject: "Resolved, that outdoor amusements are more healthful in winter than indoor amusements." The affirmative was supported by H. M. Anderson and J. M. Murdoch; the negative by F. K. Bigelow and W. J. King. The decision, which was given by the audience, was in favor of the affirmative. The discussion lasted about two hours, which says a great deal for the four speakers. If the young men of the Y. M. C. A. only keep on they will no doubt rear out some noted orators.

Victoria County Shropshire American Show.

A lot of fourteen Shropshire sheep bought from Messrs. Donald Grant & Sons and John Campbell, Jr., of Woodville, by the Mathewson Bros. of Clark Co., Dakota, was exhibited at the Victoria County Shropshire show. The sheep were sold at \$50 each. At those fairs a total of about \$500 was offered as premiums for this breed and the Victoria Shropshire was \$25, with two exceptions they were every prize for which they competed. Messrs. Mathewson are so well pleased with the quality that they purpose coming back for another lot this season. They write thus: "We had that there is a pretty keen demand for Shropshire sheep and we are profitable at the fairs may open up the way for a profitable trade for us for some time to come. We would have sold fifty or more sheeping names if we had them at the fairs." Of the above shropshire D. Grant & Sons sold four and J. Campbell, Jr. ten.

Police Court.

On Friday nine charges against citizens for neglect to comply with the provisions of the dog tax by-law came up for disposal.

On Wednesday nine citizens were hauled before the P. M. charged with infringement of by-law No. 108. This by-law is the celebrated dog tax by-law. The nine citizens were fined \$1 and costs, which practically means that they were compelled to take out tags for their dogs at a cost of \$1 and pay an additional dollar besides.

On Sunday night Chief of Police Bell received word to look out for parties who were supposed to have burglarized the store of Mr. A. H. Willis at Fenelon Falls. On Monday Officer arrested W. Swanson, who was charged with the crime and who had sold to Mr. J. Lennon a fur cap, one of the lot stolen. Swanson, it seems, went to Toronto after the cap and returned to Lindsay on Monday. A sharp look out was kept with the result that he was arrested and remanded for one week to allow of witnesses being brought to town.
