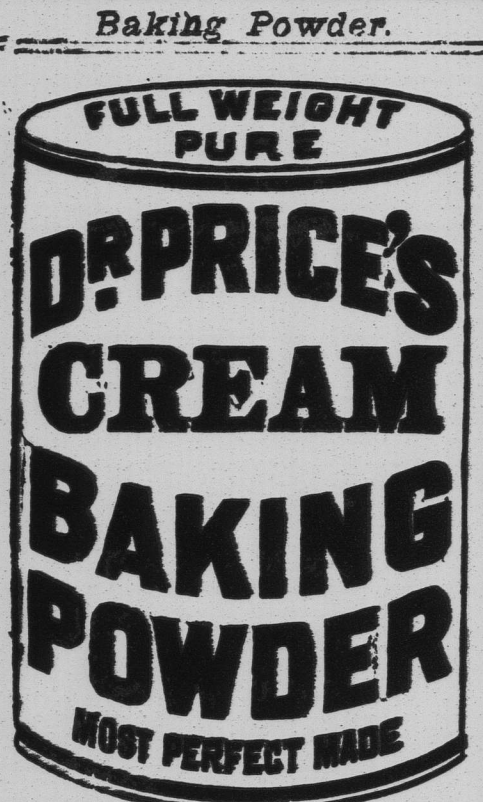

LINDSAY, FRIDAY, NOV. 25, 1887. VICTORIA COUNTY COUNCIL.

November Session. The Victoria county council assembled Tuesday afternoon, a week or two earlier than usual in order to leave more time for the completion of the county business for the year. The Reeves gathered in good time and spent an hour in general conversation over county affairs, the excellence of the Lindsay grain market, the gratifying progress of the county town, the decision against Peterboro is the Grand Junction suit, by which our neighbors are quiet in about \$200,000, and various other matters. The Warden took the chair and, having called the council to order, stated that the last meeting of the year had been called earlier, so as to facilitate winding up business for the year. He referred to the case of Peterboro v. Victoria, regarding the Boboyagon and Kiamouss bridges; and the suit of Macaulay and Stephenson against the county about the construction of a bridge in Muskoka. He had visited Bridge-bridge and had made some needed repairs to the bridge there. The warden laid before the council the following communications: From C. K. L. Porteous, manager Bank of Montreal, Lindsay, respecting the rate of interest on advances. From the assistant manager of the Grand Trunk, respecting approaches and sidings to the new grain warehouses at Lindsay. From W. Kirk, Esq., reeve of Brosebridge, respecting the unusual state of the bridge over the Mill at Brosebridge. From the secretary to the governor-general, conveying her majesty's thanks for the address of congratulation sent by the council. From the secretary of department of railways and canals, respecting requests of petitioners relative to Mr. Wm. Kennedy. From the clerk of the county of Elgin, transmitting copy of resolutions relative to the appointment of registrars, clerks, etc. From the county clerk of Wilkes, conveying resolutions of his council respecting income tax. From the Rev. A. Wilson, Boboyagon, relating to the case of the bridge over the river and bridge on Iron bridge, Boboyagon. From E. W. Gosselin, Esq., of Brosebridge, relative to construction of a bridge over the river.

TRENT VALLEY CANAL DRAW-BRIDGE AT FENELON FALLS.

Mr. JOHN DANIELA moved, seconded by Mr. JOE FELL, that this council request to the minister of railways and canals that about one hundred and thirty-seven thousand dollars \$137,000 have been expended on the locks and canal at Fenelon Falls, that the whole expenditure will be useless for the purpose of navigation until the draw-bridge across the canal on the Victoria railway is built, and that the want of this bridge is a great disadvantage and loss to those engaged in agriculture or in taking out products of the forest in the northern parts of the counties of Victoria and Peterboro. This council would therefore respectfully request the minister of railways and canals to take such immediate action as may be necessary to have the bridge built before the beginning of next season's navigation.

Mr. DANIELA moved, seconded by Mr. FELL, that the foregoing resolution be transmitted by telegraph to Hon. W. Logan at Ottawa, for presentation to the minister of railways and canals.—Carried.

LINDSAY'S NEW DEPUTY-REEVE. On motion of Mr. BRYAN, seconded by Mr. SMYTH, Mr. T. S. Williams, second deputy-revee of Lindsay, was appointed on all committees on which Col. Deacon was appointed in January last.

ANOTHER MUSKOKA BRIDGE. Mr. KIRK of Brosebridge moved, seconded by Mr. LANTORND of Macaulay, that this council build a new bridge across the Muskoka river on the Muskoka road in Brosebridge, as the present bridge is in a dangerous condition; and that this motion be referred to the road and bridge committee.—Carried.

FRIEDAY'S SESSION. The council met Tuesday morning at ten o'clock, the warden in the chair and all the members present.

STANDING RULES. Mr. SMYTH, chairman of a special committee appointed to revise the standing rules, presented a report which was read in committee of the whole. Mr. Smyth in the chair, and adopted. Several amendments were made to standing rules with the view of expediting public business and providing certain safeguards.

BOBOYAGON MECHANICS' INSTITUTE. Mr. READ moved, seconded by Mr. Fairbairn, that as the village of Boboyagon has a properly constituted mechanics institute, they receive the same grant (\$25) as other incorporated villages in the county.—The motion was referred to the finance committee after a short discussion. By a slip of the pen the word "collegiate" was written in the motion instead of "mechanics," and caused a flutter of interest through the council chamber at first.

The council then adjourned until Thursday morning, and proceeded to committee work.
