Pasteur's Cure in But

From The London Datly News. The director of the Odessa Bacteriolo Station has favored me with the following notes of the last twelve months' operations for the prevention of hydrophobia under the Pas-teurian system. Five hundred and twentyone patients, some of whom came from Turkey, were moculated, and thirteen died.

Turkey, were moculated, and thirteen died.

The director divides the patients into three groups the better to explain the propertion of fatal cases to the total number of patients dismissed as cured. In fifty-two cases the exist ense of rables in the animals by which the patients were bitten was proved by trepanning. Of these patients one died. In twelve cases the rable condition of the animals was proved by the deaths of persons hitten by the same animals, but who were not brought to the station. Of these one also died. There were 255 cases in which the patients all bitten by presumably rable animals had manifested signs of hydrophobia. Of these seven died.

Sixteen persons were inconsisted as a preventive measure, never having been bitten by animals, rable or healthy. Dr. Gammlen, the director of the Odessa Station, and an enthus sharte disciple of M. Pasteur, has been inconsisted three times, once in Paris and twice is Odessa, not for rable bites, but, as he says simply to give confidence to others.


