

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, DEC. 1, 1887.

The market was steady and comparatively quiet the past week, with good large deliveries but not the phenomenal rush of previous weeks. The roads are not so good, and American mailers having settled previous wants are playing a waiting game for a time. Prices are not materially changed. There have been considerable deliveries of dressed hogs at 25.00 to 27.75, the Lindsay market taking the lead in the district. Potatoes are scarce and in demand at high figures.


Montreal Horse Market. The horse trade is active. Last week the shipments of horses to the United States numbered 102 horses, costing \$100,000 or an average of \$1024 each. The highest price \$1000.00.
Horse and Live Stock Market. The supply of cattle on Monday at Montreal was not large. Only a few butchers visited the markets, and trade was dull at former rates. Prime beef was scarce, at from 14c to 16c per lb; pretty good from 12c to 14c per lb; common stock about 10c. Sheep and lambs in fair supply; quality not very good, the best being about 10c to 12c. United States. Sheep sold at from 25c to 30c, and lambs from 25c to 30c each. There are not many live hogs and prices continue about 20c. Dressed hogs arriving more freely, and are sold at about 90c per lb; a few choice lots at 95c per lb.
