[Continued from 4th page.] of the law. I often stop at a hotel, but I do not try to spy out or find out if they are selling liquor, but I am satisfied that the sale of liquors is going on. In town I see jolly fellows coming out of places, where is painted "bar-room," wiping their moustaches, I believe that it is a fact that the bar rooms are openly selling liquor in this county now. I do not believe that there is as much drinking going on now as there was. If I had a vote and it really came up to morrow for the repeal of the law, I would not vote for it. I fear that if the law was repealed that public morals would suffer very seriously. Now I say for the continuance of the law; if it is not enforced, it would be better off our statutes. I think it is demoralising when the law is deliberately broken. We come now to the question whether any one is to blame? In your very excellent presentment you say that the law is quite sufficient in itself, if it was only properly carried out. The law fails either from the officer not doing his duty, or from want of moral support on the part of the people. I think it is the duty of the temperance people, as they were willing that a law should be passed to take away a business, they ought to be willing to see that law enforced. What is the sentiment of the people in regard to those things, such as moral support and financial support? I am aft aid the sentiment of the people is very weak on these points. You have all heard of the Quaker to whom a man said. I am very sorry for you," to which he replied. "How many pounds are you sorry for me?" Now, the men that feel that the public morals and sefety of sciety require that they should be willing to give their moral support to the officers of the law. CARD.—To the electors of the MUNICIPALITY OF MARIPOSA.—I appeal to you for your support as SEC(ND
DEPUTY REEVE for the ensuing year, the
retiring deputy being my opponent, who by
virtue of an unjust statute endeavors to retiring deputy being my opponent, who by virtue of an unjust statute endeavors to tax you for a new nigh school building and equipments, notwithstanding the law allowed him to submit it to the popular vote. The bylaw is passed by your old council, who insist that it becomes binding at the end of three months from date of final reading unless appealed against by private individuals at their own expense. The old council say the portion of Woodville originally Mariposa, and part of high school district by reason of its incorpoporation into the new municipality of Woodville, is no longer part of high school district, as there is no special clause in the act of iscorporation relieving the village of its original obligations. This contention by Mr. Lownsbrough cannot prevail for if it should Oakwood might apply also if they had the population for incorporation and be exempt from further taxes in relation to high schools, with the high school in the middle of it. I think the present by law wholly useless, as it does not cover the whole high school district. It dought to be initiated and carried in the county council as there is more than one municipality to be taxed. If it is found necessary to resort to legal proceedings to set it aside, it ought to be done, under the circumstances, at public, not private expense. The equalization of the county assessment is unjust to Mariposa, easily discerned in the low county tax on tax tickets on like farm in Woodville, Eldon and Ops, as compared to the high rate on Mariposa farms adjoining those farms in the municipalities aforesaid. If an opportunity is afforted me by your consent at the poils next Monday help to redress your wrongs according to these views, I shall endeavor to act accordingly, and am willing, if the high school by-law is not set aside within the year ensuing and such redress obtained in your equalization for county purposes as are just and equitable.
