The wood trade alone engages two trains, one coming from Toronto with empties and transferring them at Lindsay to a train which conveys the loaded cars to this point, taking back the loaded ones in the wake of the mail trains. Three or four special trains a day is not unusual, and not light trains either—no, not by any means.
