Attempted Incendiarism—Alleged Anti-Scott-Act Outrage. A dastardly attempt was made Tuesday morning to set fire to the residence of Mt. Wm Flavelle, corner of Cambridge and Peel-sts., and also to the premises of the firm of Dundas & Flavelle Bros. on Kent-st. About three o'clock in the morning the miscreants poured coal oil on the matting at the porch in the front of the resi-dence and then applied a match. The flames were fortunately seen by Miss Flavelie in the house across the way to the south before they had made any headway. Miss Flavelle hastened across and alarming her brother quickly extinguished the flames before any great damage was done, the floor of the verandah and the side of the purch being blackened. In the attempt to set fire to the outbuilding at the rear of the

The news of the outrage created a profound sensation and it was at once set down by many as an Anti-Scott act outrage, as Mr Flavelle has been prominently identified with the passage and enforcement of the act, though not in a violent or vindictive way. It would seem most likely the miscreants did not intend to destroy the buildings, as they set the fire to the residence in the most prominent place, where it would be easily discovered before it had made any headway. If they had intended to burn the stores they would have made preparation on a large scale. The deeds are regarded generally as the acts of some villains who intended to frighten or intimidate Mr Flavelle. But it is none the less criminal on that account, as the flames might easily have spread and destroyed human life or swept down a block.
