Attempted Incest—Alleged Anti-Socialist. About three o'clock in the morning the miscreants poured coal oil on the building and set fire to it. The flames were extinguished by Miss Flavelle in the house across the way to the south before they had made any headway. Miss Flavelle hastened across and alarmed the neighbors by extinguishing the flames before any great damage was done. The floor of the verandah and the side of the porch being blasted. In the attempt to set fire to the building the fire of the store coal oil was also used, but owing to the situation it did not burn. The outrage created a profound sensation and it was at once set down by many as an Anti-Socialist act. It is supposed that the miscreants did not intend to destroy the buildings, as they saw the fire to the residence in the most prominent place, where it would be easily discovered before it had made any headway.
