What Burnirols again to 200 Annual Russian Burnir Bull Passed — Burnir B cial Circles Believe War Immisent-The Char Pacific but Powerless.

LONDON. Feb. 8. - The thoughtful journals, reviewing Prince Bismarck's speech, are as much impressed by his reserve on essential points as by his stubbornness on others. Bulgaria is the apot where the European ice is the thinnest. Prince Bismarck considers it too thin to bear his weight. He has said what he thinks is

weight. He has said what he thinks is likely to happen in every quarter of the continent where danger of hostilities is most remote. He hardly refers to Bulgaria, where the peace of Europe is hourly threatened. Russia is little likely to attack Bulgaria in Galicis. She may at any moment turn the heads of her columns towards the Balkans. All depends on the caprice of one irritable man, whose temper is already sorely tried.

Berlin, Feb. 8—The military bill passed the reichetag to-day. Prince Bismarck's promise in his speech in the reichetag, to support any Russian proposals compatible with the treaty of Berlin relative to Bulgaris, was made with the concurrence of Germany's allies. According to frontier advices the movement of Russian troops continues. Despatches from Bucharest say that the Russian minister there, since the publication of the Austro German treaty, has presented to the government a note demanding an explanation of Roumania's attitude toward the triple alliance.

THE FEARLESS BRANDENBURGERS. In the course of a speech at the Brandenburg dinner Prince William of Prussia, heir presumptive to the crown, said : "I know that a section of the public, especially a section abroad, imputes to me a careless and thoughtless longing for war for the sake of glory. God preserve me from the sake of glory. God preserve me from such giddiness. I repudiate all such accusations with horror. I am a soldier. All the Brandenburgers are soldiers. I conclude with the words uttered by Prince Bismarck on Monday in the reichstag, which showed the grand spectacle of popular representation going locked hand-in-hand with the government. I adapt to Brandenburg the sentence, 'We Brandenburgers on'v fear God, and nothing else in this world."

PEACE OR WAR. BERLIN, Feb. 12.-The peace illusion with which Bismarck's speech invested the situation has passed away. It is beginning to be realized that there was nothing really peaceful in the speech beyond leaving the czar the alternative of peace or war, while pointing out the road along which Russia can retire if the car feels himself safe in

A BRIGHTER OUTLOOK FOR PEACE. The London correspondent of the New York Times cables on Sunday :- There seems to day a greater chance of the preservation of perce than has been apparent before in many months. For the first time, I should say, since autumn the bal ance of probabilities is distinctly against an outbreak of hostilities. Of course any iay may bring something to tip the scales

day may bring something to tip the scales the other way with a malevolent lurch, but for the moment the best informed people here feel relieved of apprehension.

Lord Salisbury's speech has served to put the crowning stone on this edifice of hope. He, to all intents and purposes, ranged England on the side of the central European alliance. His words have been accorded an attention on the continent scarcely less than Bismarck's. In one scarcely less than Bismarck's. In one important respect he supplements and completes Bismark by speaking boldly on the subject which the German chancellor had to handle with circumspection. Germany could not promise to interfere to keep the Russians out of Bulgaria even if Austria went in, and Vienna and Pesth both noted keeply and gloomily this reservation; but England can interfere, and he practically says she will, and this gives Austria an ally whose presence is a fair compensation for Germany's reserve on this particular point of Bulgaria. Thus the cordon of the league of pescs is made so strong and compact that nobody believes Russia will be mad enough to try and break it.

This conclusion, however, is far from This conclusion, however, is far from involving any relaxation on the part of Germany and Austria in the work of preparation for the worst. I hear from Berlin that a bill will be laid before the Prussian landtag this month or next appropriating twenty-two millions of dollars for doubling all the railway tracks on the eastern frontier to facilitate mobilization. The Austrian war office, too, is extremely busy in getting together food supplies, which include large American contracts of tinned meats. 


