LINDSAY BOARD OF EDUCA-TION.

spector Knight's Report on the Public Reheels—Au able and exhautive re-view of the situation.

Subjoined is the report of Inspector Knight, presented to the board at a recent sitting and referred to committee for consideration:

To the Board of Education for the Town of Lindsay. GENTLEMEN,-I beg to report that I examined the various divisions of the public schools in the months of November and and he went over and settled it.

It has often happened that persons who have been pupils of our school leave Lindsay and go elsewhere. In their new homes many of them are successful in business, are advanced to positions of trust, are a credit to themselves and the pride of their credi to themselves and the pride of their friends. In any allusions to these persons in the newspapers and elsewhere it is the custom to give all the credit of their success to the high school, as if our public school teachers had done nothing to mould the character and lay a solid foundation on which later workmen might safely build. I trust that any who have been thoughtless in the past will be careful in future to give henor to whom honor is

due.


