Lindsay Board of Education. A special meeting of the board was called for Wednesday evening, and at 8 o'clock a fair for Wednesday evening, and at 8 o'clock a fair quorum were present. The object was to receive the report of building committee as to the possibility of reducing the cost of the proposed collegiate institute without making any extensive alterations in the plans. Your committee having reported the facts as above would ask that further instructions be given by the board as to the preparation of new plans and specificatiens. On motion of Mr. J. R. McNeillie, seconded by Mr. Winters, the report was adopted. An hour's discussion t en took place interspersed with questions asked Mr. luffus who was present, who presented a rough sketch of a cheaper building. Still, strive as they might—cutting off everything not strictly necessary—it was found impossible to reduce the cost lower than \$23,089. Mr Stewart and Mr. Kennedy both declared against expending anything over \$20,000 w.thout authority. In the discussion it was stated that the Chatham architect gave as his opinion that were he to erect his building now it would co-t about \$24,090. On motion of Mr. Corneil. seconded by Mr. McNeilie, the Secretary was instructed to tender Mr Itutley, architect of Toronto the sum of \$40 in recognition of his valuable services to the members of the board recently in Toronto giving information. On motion of Mr. Stewart. seconded by Mr. McNeillie, the board adjourned to meet again on Saturday evening at 7.30, when it was understood that the chairman and all members of the board would be present.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, March 22, 1888. Montreal Live Stock Markets. There were pretty liberal arrivals of cattle at

the Viger market, Montreal, for Montreal. The butchers bought all they require for the present. Probably not a few will be held for another market. Prices declined considerably since Thursday. Best beeves, 41c. per 1b: pretty good, 4c. to 4je; ordinary, 3jc. and more lean beasts 3c; milkmen's strippers, \$3 to \$6 off the amounts paid last week. A few sheep offered and there was a better enquiry; prices 4½c. to 5½c. Spring lambs \$4 to \$6.50. The calves off-red were all small, common veals, at \$2.50 to \$5.50. The good calves are held for the Easter market. There is some inquiry for live hogs. Late sales have been made at 6c to a little over 6½c. Still higher figures are asked for good porkers for the Easter market. The Montreal Horse Market.

The Montreal horse market is fairly active, considerable numbers being bought for the American markets. They are not generally of such good quality as formerly. Shipments to the United States last week were 150 horses, costing \$14.829. The highest priced lot was 14, costing \$1,801; the lowest priced was 22, costing \$8,155. Lindsay Market Prices.


