

Pancakes in Variety. On cold winter mornings pan cakes of all kinds hold an important place at the breakfast table; the buckwheat cake the most cherished of all. School Section Number Five, Ops. [To the Editor of THE POST.]

SIR,-The school house in section No. 5, Ope, Kenny's), having been unfortunately destroyed by fire, it has been considered by some of the ratepayers that it would be better to form two ections by dividing the present section, No. 5, and taking some of the lots from adjoining sec

tions.

With a view to carry out this proposal, if found expedient, the township council directed their clerk, Mr. J. O'Leary, and myself to prepare a report recommending what lots should be included in the proposed sections.

In compliance with those instructions we have prepared a report, the substance of which is as follows:

Con. 1.—Lots 1 to 13 inclusive. Con. 2.—W. ½ 5, w. pt. 6, lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12. 13, e. ½ 14. Con. 3.—W. pt. 7, w. pt. 8, lot 9, w. ½ 10,

Section No. 8 to contain: Con. 3.—E. ½ 10, lote 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, e. ½ 17, n.-e. ½ 18, e. ½ 19, e. ½ 20.

Con. 4.—W. pt. 10, w. pt. 11, lots 12 to 20 inclu-

Con. 5.—W. pt. of lots 14, 15, 16, 17, 18.

We have supposed that the school house of section No. 5 would be placed at or near the seconer of lot No. 9, in the 1st con.; and that of section No. 3 at or near the seconer of lot No. 16 in the 3rd con.

We have placed all the lots in some section with the understanding that those particle who have supported the Lindsay public school or the separate school can do so if they choose.

The above plan seems to us the only one possible to afford school accommodation for every child. The only question is whether the rate-payers will be willing to pay an additional school tax for increased accommodation.

A public meeting of all the parties interested will be held at the old school house (recently refitted) on Tuesday, April 10th, at 3 p.m., when an opportunity will be given to discuss the proposed plan, or any modification which may be proposed.

—The Ontario Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows has issued its report for 1887, showing that in the year 1,601 members were initiated, 130 admitted by card, 131 reinstated. The deaths had been 97, leaving the net increase 809, and the present membership 15,356. No less a sum than \$51,657 was paid in relief, sick benefits, annuities, funerals, etc. The receipts of lodges were \$137,314, and the total funds stand at \$578 617.


