This soon brought all the others, including the combine house, down to the same price. The supply was more than sufficient to meet all demands. The combine is expected to depress prices still further at an early day. A Front street commission house received the following from a leading Collingwood firm this morning: "You are doubtless aware that a combination has been formed by certain egg buyers in this province with a view to controlling prices in the country and selling in Toronto at extremely low prices in order to help them in their scheme of depressing prices in the country. This, we hope, shall not be permitted by such men as yourself in the trade, whose interest would be seriously interfered with by such a course, Kindly let us know whether you will be in the market during the season for eggs, and keep us advised from time to time what you can pay in your carriers here, and we will do what we can to assist in frustrating the scheme of the association egg buyers."

THE COUNTY CATTLE FAIRS.

To the Editor of THE POST.] SIR,-Dr. Coulter driven to the proof offers sertificates which do not even pretend to cover the point at issue. They are put forward simply to deceive. Dr. Coulter wanders off into sations and personal reflections which he dare not put in definite, distinct shape, and, coward-like, closes the correspondence "as far as he is concerned." I did not make my charges that they should be evaded. They are simple, direct and in plain English, easy of comprehen sion. Why does not Dr. Coulter meet them fairly and squarely? The proof is admittedly in his own hands; why does he not produce it? I have had the statements from the doctors them. have had the statements from the doctors themselves, and I well know whereof I speak. Dr. Coulter has already visited them twice; if he did not ask them to sign his companion Dr. Degrassi did. Dr.Coulter claims to be on "friendly terms" with them; he "was speaking to them to-day." Then why does he not get from them a direct denial of my words? Dr. Coulter publishes a certificate from Drs. Degrassi and Herriman, which only shews that they were not aware that Dr. Coulter was an applicant. Why did he not go to those better informed? The councillors who were being canvassed or Councillors Crandell and Walters who were engineering the business? Will he tell me that the conversation between himself and Walters, heard by other parties, is untrue? I state that the petition although not in favor of Dr. Coulter was used when his name was submitted to strengthen his claim. Will he deny this? I do not wish impossibilities. If Dr.Coulter cannot get just what he may require from Drs. Clarke and Kempt he may publish Dr. Clarke's explanatory letter received by Coun. Harry Walters. ALUM BAKING POWDERS.

ALUM BAKING POWDERS.

Their use injurious to Health and their sale contrary to law. Two men were recently convicted in St. Lawence county, Newi York, for violating the food on laws of that state by seiling alum aking powders in imitation of pure cream of arter baking powders. The law of New York similar to that of this province in forbidding the sale of additerated and injurious articles of food, but the courts had not before construed it in so far as it related to the sale of alum baking

powders.
The baking powder sold by the accused was proved to be made from alum by Gittett of Chicago, and expert testimony was taken to show the unwholesomeness of alum in baking powders, bread or other food.
The court in inflicting the extreme penalty of the law upon the accused expressed regret at not being able to impose a punishment more acarly in accordance with the seriousness of the offence.

The sale of alum baking powders is prohibited by direct statute in England. It should be the same here; yet our laws, if not so specific, are probably sufficient to put a step to the business of rigidly enferred. It is easid that many brands if alum powders are being introduced into the hominion, and we bespeak the attention of our rabble analysts to the matter.
