As he has become so widely known through his work a brief sketch of his life may not be uninteresting to many. He was born in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, in 1856. When he was but nine years old his father went to California and thus Willie was left entirely to the care of his mother. From his childhood he was full of life and vivacity and possessed an almost inexhaustible fund of honor, so that at an early age he became a sort of hero among "the boys." Like many others he gave way to some of the evil habits that injure so many of the young men. At the age of fourteen he was placed in a business house in Halifax and there he began to give a loose rein to his evil propensities. He was stopped in his career by an attack of fever and returning home entered into a drug business in New Glasgow. He attended faithfully tofhis business but after business he contrived and carried out all sorts of sports and carousal. His poor mother was almost broken hearted with the conduct of her boy of whom she expected on much. He was most devoted to his mother in every other way and did all he could to please her. At last through her entreaty he attended special gospel meetings then being held in one of the churches in New Glasgow. Though not deeply moved by a sense of his sin he made up his mind to accept Christ and lead a different life. This was in the spring of "5 and from that day all talents and resources of his nature were turned in an opposite channel. He began exhorting others to turn from the folly of sin to God, and his labors were everywhere attended with success.
